



October 13. *The Jersey Brothers* by Sally Mott Freeman




The extraordinary, real-life adventure of three brothers at the center of the most dramatic turning points of World War II and their mad race to change history—and save one of their own.

November 10. *Votes for Women* by Winifred Conklin





December 8. *Lessons from Lucy* by Dave Barry





January 12. *The Giver of Stars* by Jojo Moyes




Set in Depression-era America, a breathtaking story of five extraordinary women and their remarkable journey through the mountains of Kentucky as horseback librarians

February 9. *The Dutch House* by Ann Patchett





March 9. *The Right Sort of Man* by Allison Montclair




In a London slowly recovering from World War II, two very different women join forces to launch a business venture in the heart of Mayfair—The Right Sort Marriage Bureau.
